ETBU Launches Campaign to Move School of Nursing to Downtown Marshall

The ETBU School of Nursing is relocating to the Marshall Grand in downtown Marshall. The School of Nursing attracts many students every year as our graduates are highly sought after for to their outstanding knowledge and compassionate care for patients. ETBU has been equipping Bachelor of Science Nurses with a high level of efficiency resulting in cohorts which consistently perform with 100% pass rates on the National Council Licensure Examination. The relocation of the School of Nursing is needed as the current location is inadequate for the expansion and growth of the program.

School of Nursing Dean Rebekah Grigsby is enthusiastic about the move downtown. "Providing our students with the latest innovative techniques, modern simulation equipment, and enhanced clinical facilities will better prepare ETBU nurses with the skills, experience, and confidence to effectively address patient health care needs. The relocation to our new downtown campus in the historic Marshall Grand will enable our program to grow and help meet the profession's acute nursing shortage."

The cost for renovation of dedicated space at the Marshall Grand and for new equipment is

\$2.2 million. ETBU recently received a \$400,000 challenge grant from the J.E. and L.E. Mabee Foundation of Tulsa, Oklahoma, that will be awarded upon successfully completing the campaign project balance of \$770,000. 
Alumni Spotlight

Monica Dudley Weldon (91') taught science courses in higher education and public schools for 23 years before founding *Bridge the Gap-SYNGAP-Education and Research Foundation* in 2014. Monica currently serves as the President and CEO where she works to raise awareness, fund research, and support families who are affected by the SYNGAP1 genetic mutation. The SYNGAP1 gene is often referred to as the "learning and memory gene" as it plays a crucial role in brain development.



Monica's work is very personal as her son was the first to be diagnosed with the SYNGAP1 gene mutation at Texas Children's Genetics Clinic in 2012. At the time her son was one of six known people with the condition in North America. As she learned more about her son's condition she began to chronicle her journey on a blog to help her process the information. Her blog helped her connect with other families who are affected by the SYNGAP1 mutation. They formed a support network, but more work was needed. Monica then took a leap of faith to stop teaching and start *Bridge the Gap*.

Monica is working every day to bring hope to people who have family members affected by the SYNGAP1 mutation. She is making an impact in the lives of others as she fights for research dollars, convinces doctors to initiate research, and provides resources and knowledge to family members.
