General Education Advisor Guide: Spring 2026 & Mini-Terms

Below are suggested options from departments for general education when required classes are not specified for a major. See that the mini-term options are noted as well.

Block Tuition & Mini-Term Reminders

- Block tuition covers 18 hours in a long semester PLUS any hours in the associated mini-terms. Cost per hour over 18 is \$560 per semester hour. Tuition for mini-terms is discounted for those with block tuition at \$50 per credit hour.
- A student has to be enrolled full-time in the Spring 2026 semester to take January/May terms as part of the spring block tuition. If the student is not full-time when the spring semester starts, then tuition will be charged to the student for the January/May terms.
- August, December, and Winter Terms are part of the block tuition if students are enrolled full time in Fall classes.
- If a student wants to take 19 hours during a long term, it must be approved by the Dean and Provost. Inform students who enroll in one-week minis that their courses will be open in Canvas 6 days prior and they may have assignments up to 6 days after the course meeting dates to allow them to have additional time to work on out-of-class assignments in a more manageable manner. Encourage them to look in Canvas for the specific due dates.
